A Message from Pastor Mike-


Over the next few weeks, we will be exploring Paul's letter to the Philippians, his most optimistic and joyful New Testament letter. He wrote to the church at the ancient city of Philippi, letting them know that all was well with him and that all would be well (in the long run) for them: "I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ." (1:6) One of the amazing things about this epistle is that it was written from jail! Paul was imprisoned, and yet he struck a positive and hopeful chord. He made the point that his suffering had only strengthened his resolve to spread the good news of the gospel and to live for Christ.

Just as we spent a few weeks in Romans last month, having a bit longer to examine a single book of the Bible will allow us to see the context of a group of early Christians. The more we do that, the more we find that our modern times present us with similar challenges. It must have been difficult to teach the truths of the Christian faith before the invention of the printing press. Philippians contains what has been called a "Christ Poem," or "Christ hymn." Just as the Jewish people had a hymn book in the Book of Psalms, the early church in the first century had music and hymns as part of their worship services. Chapter 2 shows that this was one way of succinctly passing on the good news that a new kingdom had been inaugurated by Christ:

"who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death— even death on a cross. Therefore, God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father."

Philippians speaks to a number of key ideas and themes. Humility and contentment, peace and joy, unity and perseverance. Paul asked what it means that Christ took on the form of a human being and gave up his preexisting Divinity to come to earth and dwell among us. The apostle shows that what Jesus' did is so much more than a historical event. Jesus' life matters for us because it changed everything... in the first century, today, and forever! Paul tells us how we can participate in this greatest event ever; he tells us what we can do today: "Hold fast to what we have attained," and what we can do with the rest of our lives: "Press on toward the goal."

"Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things." **Philippians 4:8**

THANK YOU to the members of 15th Ave. Christian Church for partnering with Broadway Outreach Center for a once a month community clothing/food ministry to be stationed in your beautiful facility. We have prayed for a place to hold this ministry as we know you have prayed for a ministry to help you be vocal in your faith of serving others. God has answered all our prayers and we hope that we will see you every fourth Saturday to share your beliefs with those who use the ministry.



Let us tell you a little about the clothing ministry and how it works. People donate clothing (start cleaning out those closets!) volunteers sort it, take what is proper and displays it for anyone to take on the 4th Saturday of the month. We have every size male, female, and child. Approx. 15 racks and 5 tables are used each giveaway and then sorted again before storing. Clothing not acceptable or not chosen that day is sent to Goodwill or to another part of the ministry – recycling. Material is developed from the clothing and made into cage comforters or incubator pads or cat toys for animal shelters, adult cover-ups for home care facilities and nursing homes, T-shirts are made into long scarves that wrap around the neck and have pockets for homeless shelters, and infant and toddler bibs for daycare centers.


Our food ministry provides take out meals for those shopping for clothes, for people to come in and pick up, and to be delivered to those who order ahead of time. This is the only ministry in the city that delivers a weekend meals to shut-ins, high-rises, and families.

In 2022, we served over 1400 people in the clothing ministry and 840 homes in the food ministry not counting those who picked up their meals. Just in the recycling program over 5000 items were sent out to other organizations. There is a place for every volunteer and we look forward to seeing you take part in the program.
